


What is Trellis?

- 120,000+ users












1. AAAS Member Engagement


1. Member Engagement – MemberCentral Community



- Over 100,000 members for whom we had very little demographic information.
- Added all members to MemberCentral Community group last October.
- Currently executing a "Getting to Know You" content strategy.
- 3 posts per week science news, AAAS updates, Friday chats




1. Member Engagement – AAAS Sections



- AAAS members may also belong to up to 3 of 24 overall subject-specific sections.
- Created as child groups in the MemberCentral Community hierarchy.
- First time these sections have been able to communicate – amongst themselves and with the rest of the AAAS membership.

1. Member Engagement – Force for Science group




- Initial conversations confirmed that science advocacy is a resonant topic with our members.
- Created a child group in the MemberCentral hierarchy around our Force for Science activities.
- Open to any AAAS member rapidly approaching 1000 members.

- Multiple programs using Trellis for engagement – including AAAS Science and Technology Policy Fellowships
- Parent group not restricted to Fellows – allows dissemination of program news
- Child groups for alumni, affinity groups and more




- Public Engagement with Science

 - A AAAS / AAU coalition with additional partners
